



120TH ANNIVERSARY OF GRANT'S FARM JAVIER TORRES-GOMEZ

The Grant's Farm 120th Anniversary Mural is a mural I created last year at the entrance to Grant's Farm's Tiergarden. This mural captures the history, architecture, and most representative and iconic elements of Grant's Farm. The architectural elements that can be seen are the cabin belonging to Ulysses S. Grant, the Mansion, and the Bauernhuf building. The natural elements present include vegetation, trees, and animals such as peacocks, macaws, deer, and bison, as well as the iconic Claydesdales with their carriage, among others. The mural is topped with the gold Anheuser-Busch logo and busts of Gussy Busch and August Busch, which are important pieces in the history of Grant's Farm. Finally, I captured the diversity of visitors through the children interacting with some of the farm animals. I hope you enjoy visiting this mural at Grant's Farm as much as I enjoyed painting it.


COMMUNITY GARDEN CONTAINER-LUISA OTERO PRADA, AND ANDREA HUGHES

UNTITLED (MY PEOPLE) - CARLOS ROLON

Project Carlos Rolon (Chicago, Born 1970) is known for his multi-disciplinary practice whose work employs a wide range of media to explore themes of craft, ritual, beauty, spirituality, identity, and its relationship to art history and the institution. Born to a Puerto-Rican family, Rolon's background allows the artist to explore personal ideas which directly deal with questions of inclusion, aspiration and cultural identity.

Often connecting childhood memories, the artist bore witness to the ways in which households have adapted to new American middle¬ class lifestyles with homes, walls and furniture adorned with ephemera of color, texture, patterns and items brought into the home to create a sense of longing. It is from that here Rolon takes inspiration and transforms these vantage points producing a hybrid language of exuberant flora paintings, sculpture, social practice and site-specific installations composed of diverse materials that offer opportunities for self¬ reflection, rich symbolism and community engagement, bridging the divide between public and private.

Rolon explores how cultivated settings and social barriers operate and its relationship to postcolonial spaces. The work is at once melancholic, excessive and exuberant, poised somewhere between celebration and regret. Inviting the viewer to engage in discourse and discussion.

I AM NOT A RUMOR- JOSE LUIS VARGAS

Jose Luis Vargas was born in 1965 and is a graduate of the Royal College of Art in London; Pratt Institute New York, and The Skowhegan School of Painting and Sculpture in Maine. Since 2000, he's taken a serious interest in community radio, which lead him to Mexico City to study sound art. Besides teaching classes at the School of Visual Arts in New York City and the University of Puerto Rico-Rfo Piedras.

He also founded The Museum of Supernatural
History, a multi-genre performance project that
brings together artists of different disciplines. Past
exhibitions include Roberto Paradise, PR; Museo de
Arte, Caguas, PR; Hidrante, PR: Tripoli Gallery, NY,
Rachel Uffner Gallery, NY, and Embajada, PR. He lives
and works in Carolina, Puerto Rico.

TILE TRIP-ZÉH PALITO

This expansive mural fuses Palito's bold, nature-inspired motifs with Bernhardt's signature pop-culture references, resulting in a dynamic, immersive composition that electrifies the urban landscape. With their distinct yet complementary styles, the artists weave together imagery that celebrates movement, culture, and the joy of artistic expression. Tile Trip transforms the space into a visual journey—inviting viewers to engage with its rhythm and energy while reimagining the possibilities of public art.

Carlos Zamora is the Chief Creative Officer and founder of CARTEL. Prior creative leadership roles in St. Louis include Express Scripts, KO&Co. and FH. Before arriving to the United States in April 2006, he worked at the Publishing Department at Casa de la Cultura Ecuatoriana Benjamin Carrion in Quito, Ecuador; Casa de las Americas, La Gaceta de Cuba Magazine,

the Alicia Alonso National Ballet Company, the
Heritage Office of Havana, the Habanos S.A. Cigar
Company and the National Union of Writers and
Artists in La Habana. An author, design advocate and
educator, he has served as President of AIGA St. Louis
– the local chapter for the American Institute of
Graphic Arts – the professional organization of
design. He currently serves on the Art Advisory Board
for Lambert International Airport, and the Tennessee
Williams Festival. His work has been published by The
New York Times, Time's Magazine, the New York
Observer, The Boston Globe, Advertising Age, The
American Lawyer, The Wall Street Journal, Alive, and
St. Louis Magazine.

ALL FOR CITY MURAL-GONZ JOVE

A powerful symbol of unity, fostering a sense of pride and connection among fans who saw their stories reflected on the walls of their beloved STL." The mural is located at 308 N. 21st Street, (building is also home to the St. Louis Sports Commission), across from CITY PARK at Olive Street

"This project began in late October through a partnership with the building's owner to celebrate St. Louis CITY SC's incredible inaugural year and the tremendous support and passion of St. Louis' soccer community, including our recognized supporter groups. We hope that when people drive up Olive Street toward CITY PARK, soccer fan or not, they feel a sense of pride and optimism in this spirit of a new St. Louis.

This mural stands as a tangible manifestation of a soccer city deeply rooted in the sport's rich history. I sought to convey the profound passion that St. Louisans harbor for soccer. The deliberate choice to maintain the traditional black and white design of the ball is a deliberate nod to history, a visual thread connecting the mural to the sport's enduring legacy. This mural, therefore, becomes more than a mere visual spectacle; it emerges as a living testament to the shared stories and fervor of acommunity deeply entrenched in the world of soccer.
